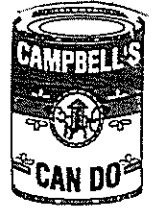

A motion was made by Skupa and seconded by Pearson to approve the claims and warrants to be drawn for same as funds become available. Roll call: aye - 4, nay - 0.

A motion was made Skupa and seconded by Trambly to approve the Treasurer's Report. Roll call: aye - 4, nay - 0.

Employee payroll, insurance and tax reports were examined.

Ron Pankoke reported on village maintenance issues.

Jeanie Schmidt presented a written report on the status of Mid Rivers 911.

Jeanie Schmidt presented a written report on clerk issues.

Questions and concerns about nuisance properties were heard from the public.

Mike Schultes, with JEO Consulting Group, presented information on our Road Program.

Bids for the Water Project were reviewed. A motion was made by Trambly and seconded by Lang to award the 2017 Water System Improvements 'Group A' project to Myers Construction Inc., the 'Group B' project to Sargent Drilling and the 'Group C' project to Utility Service Co. Roll call: aye - 4, nay - 0.

Mike Schultes presented information on the Security Grant Mapping Project. The Board gave the go-ahead to proceed as previously approved.

A motion was made by Pearson and seconded by Trambly to approve the request by the Campbell Area Foundation to apply for a Special Designated Liquor License for their fund raiser on February 17, 2018. Roll call: aye - 4, nay - 0.

A motion was made by Trambly and seconded by Skupa to give the village employees Campbell Bucks in the amount of \$30.00 for Christmas. Roll call: aye - 4, nay - 0.

A motion was made by Skupa and seconded by Trambly to transfer ownership of Grandview Manor and its properties to the Campbell Rural Fire Protection District, subject to all easements and reservations as set forth at the time of transfer, for the purpose of turning the facility into a fire hall/meeting center. The motion, made this 13th day of November 2017 further states that said transfer of facility and the property it sets on shall only occur after the Campbell Rural Fire Protection District successfully provides proof to the Village of Campbell guaranteed funding to undertake and complete said fire hall project and shows the Village a specific timetable to such project completion and proof they can legally undertake and complete such project. Roll call: aye - 4, nay - 0.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:16 p.m. to the call of the Chair.

**SPECIAL MEETING
MONDAY, NOVEMBER 20, 2017**

A Special Meeting of the Village of Campbell Board of Trustees was held in the Community Hall on Monday, November 20, 2017, with Chairman Steve Skupa and Trustees Bill Pearson and Nelson Trambly present. Absent: Rodney Lang (excused) and Greg L'Heureux (excused). Jeanie Schmidt was also present.

Chairman Skupa called the meeting to order at 7:45 a.m. Notice of the meeting was posted in three public places in the Village. The Nebraska Open Meeting Act is posted on the south wall of the Community Hall.

The Pledge of Allegiance was said in unison.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss funding for the water project.

Board Member Skupa introduced Ordinance No. 17-3 Amended entitled:

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 17-3 TO
MODIFY CERTAIN PROVISIONS REGARDING THE TERMS OF
THE NOTES TO BE ISSUED PURSUANT TO SAID ORDINANCE
AND ORDERING THE PUBLICATION OF THE AMENDING
ORDINANCE IN PAMPHLET FORM**

and moved that the statutory rule requiring reading on three different days be suspended. Board member Trambly seconded the motion. Roll call: aye - Pearson, Skupa, Trambly; nay - 0. Motion carried.

Said ordinance was then read by title and thereafter Board Member Trambly moved for final passage of the ordinance, which motion was seconded by Board Member Pearson. The Chairman then stated the question, "Shall Ordinance No. 17-3 Amended be passed and adopted?" Roll call: aye - Pearson, Skupa, Trambly; nay - 0. Motion carried.

The passage and adoption of said ordinance having been concurred in by a majority of all members of the Board, the Chairman declared the ordinance adopted and the Chairman, in the presence of the Board, signed and approved the ordinance and the Clerk attested the passage and approval of the same and affixed her signature thereto and ordered the Ordinance to be published in pamphlet form as required by law. A true, correct and complete copy of said ordinance is on file in the clerk's office.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:51 a.m. to the call of the chair.

November is National Alzheimer's Disease Month

Alzheimer's disease (AD) is the most common cause of disruption to mental functioning in people over 60. While normal aging slows down our ability to process and recall information, AD is significantly more destructive to the structure and function of the brain.

The Alzheimer's Association has put together a list of 10 Warning Signs of Alzheimer's. Probably all of us have had one or more of these things happen, and they do become more frequent as we age, but for AD sufferers, many of these events are happening often and the frequency and severity inexorably increases. This is sad evidence of the destruction occurring within the AD brain.

Currently 4 million Americans are estimated to be suffering from AD! This adds up to huge costs: the U.S. alone spends \$90 billion per year on AD, including medical costs, long-term care costs and loss of productivity. According to the National Institute on Aging, the number of Americans with AD is expected to triple in the next two decades.

At present, the cause of the disease is unknown and there is no cure, but there is hope that taking preventative measures now may lead to a memory-filled future.

WARNING SIGNS OF ALZHEIMER'S

1. Memory loss that affects job skills.
2. Difficulty performing familiar tasks.
3. Problems with language, e.g. forgetting simple words or substituting inappropriate words.
4. Time and/or place disorientation, i.e. more than momentary confusion.
5. Poor or decreased judgment.
6. Problems with abstract thinking, e.g. simple math
7. Misplacing things, i.e. losing things in obvious places or misplacing things in unusual places.
8. Changes in mood or behavior; may be rapid changes without apparent reason.
9. Personality changes.
10. Loss of initiative; lack of interest in usual pursuits.

Individuals who exhibit several of these symptoms should see a physician.

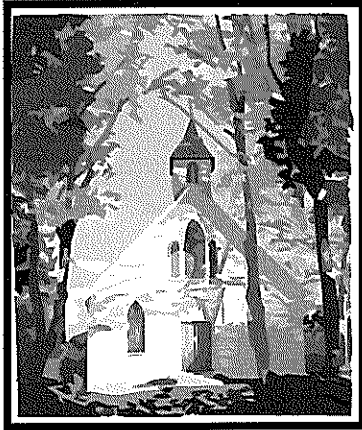

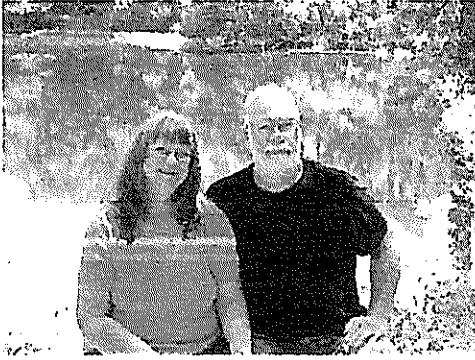
