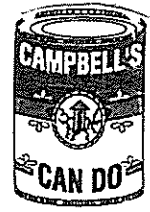

VILLAGE OF CAMPBELL
CITY COUNCIL
SPECIAL MEETING
TUESDAY, OCTOBER 16, 2018

A Special Meeting of the Village of Campbell Board of Trustees was held in the Clerk's Office on Tuesday, October 16, 2018, with Chairman Steve Skupa and Trustees Rodney Lang, Bill Pearson and Nelson Trambly present. Absent: Greg L'Heureux (excused). Jeanie Schmidt, Ron Pankoke, Brad Slaughter with Ameritas and Mike Schultes and Taylor Schneider with JEO Consulting Group were also present.

Chairman Skupa called the meeting to order at 8:00 a.m. Notice of the meeting was posted in three public places in the Village. The Nebraska Open Meeting Act is posted on the south wall of the Community Hall.

The Pledge of Allegiance was said in unison.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss: 1) paying off the original water bond; 2) issuing \$700,000 in water bond anticipation notes; 3) review downtown water main plans and authorize JEO to proceed with regulator reviews and bidding.

A motion was made by Skupa and seconded by Trambly to excuse L'Heureux's absence. Roll call: aye - 4, nay - 0.

A motion was made by Trambly and seconded by Lang to adopt Resolution No. 18-4 paying off the Water Utility Bond Anticipation Notes, series 2017. Roll call: aye - Lang, Pearson, Skupa, Trambly; nay - 0; absent - L'Heureux.

RESOLUTION NO. 18-4

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CHAIRPERSON AND BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF CAMPBELL, NEBRASKA, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. There are currently outstanding Water Utility Bond Anticipation Notes, Series 2017, in the outstanding principal amount of \$700,000 which mature on December 15, 2018, and are optional for payment any time on or after April 15, 2018.

Section 2. In accordance with their option provisions, the Notes described as follows are hereby called for payment on the date set forth in the Designation of Call Date (as defined below):

Water Utility Bond Anticipation Notes, Series 2017, dated December 28, 2017, numbered as they are shown on the books and records of the Paying Agent and Registrar, in the total outstanding principal amount of \$700,000. The principal amount, maturity date and CUSIP listing of said notes is as follows:

<u>Principal Amount</u>	<u>Maturity Date</u>	<u>CUSIP Number</u>

Section 3. The Notes redeemed are to be paid at the office of the Village Treasurer in Campbell, Nebraska, the paying agent and registrar for the Notes.

Section 4. The Chairperson or the Village Clerk of the Village (each, an "Authorized Officer") are hereby authorized at any time on or after the date of this resolution to determine the call date for said bonds on behalf of the Village and such determination, when made in writing (the "Designation of Call Date"), shall constitute the action of the Village without further action of the Chairperson and Board. The Call Date shall be set for any time on or after the date of adoption of this Resolution, provided, however, that on and after April 30, 2019, the Authorized Officers shall have no authority to make any such determination hereunder without further action of the Chairperson and Board of the Village and this resolution shall be of no further force and effect.

Section 5. A true copy of this Resolution shall be filed immediately by the Village Clerk with the Paying Agent and Registrar and the Paying Agent and Registrar is hereby irrevocably instructed to take all actions appropriated for the calling and redeeming of said Notes in accordance with the Designation of Call Date.

PASSED AND APPROVED this 16th day of October, 2018.

A motion was made by Skupa and seconded by Pearson to waive the statutory three reading requirement for Ordinance No. 18-2 on three different days. Roll call: aye - Lang, Pearson, Skupa, Trambly; nay - 0; absent - L'Heureux.

A motion was made by Trambly and seconded by Pearson to adopt Ordinance No. 18-2 providing for the issuance of water utility bond anticipation notes, series 2018, of the Village of Campbell. Roll call: aye - Lang, Pearson, Skupa, Trambly; nay - 0; absent - L'Heureux. A complete copy of the ordinance is on file in the clerk's office.

A motion was made by Skupa and seconded by Trambly to authorize JEO Consulting Group to proceed with regulator reviews and bidding for replacing the downtown water main. Roll: aye - Lang, Pearson, Skupa; nay - Trambly; absent - L'Heureux.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:30 a.m. to the call of the chair.

The Board came out of executive session at 9:38 a.m.

November is National Alzheimer's Disease Month

Alzheimer's disease (AD) is the most common cause of disruption to mental functioning in people over 60. While normal aging slows down our ability to process and recall information, AD is significantly more destructive to the structure and function of the brain.

The Alzheimer's Association has put together a list of 10 Warning Signs of Alzheimer's. Probably all of us have had one or more of these things happen, and they do become more frequent as we age, but for AD sufferers, many of these events are happening often and the frequency and severity inexorably increases. This is sad evidence of the destruction occurring within the AD brain.

Currently 4 million Americans are estimated to be suffering from AD! This adds up to huge costs: the U.S. alone spends \$90 billion per year on AD, including medical costs, long-term care costs and loss of productivity.

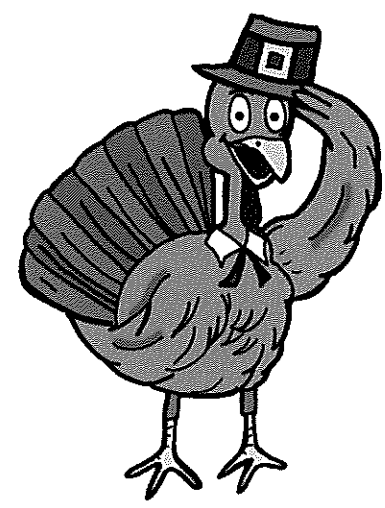
According to the National Institute on Aging, the number of Americans with AD is expected to triple in the next two decades. At present, the cause of the disease is unknown and there is no cure, but there is hope that taking preventative measures now may lead to a memory-filled future.

WARNING SIGNS OF ALZHEIMER'S

1. Memory loss that affects job skills.
2. Difficulty performing familiar tasks.
3. Problems with language, e.g. forgetting simple words or substituting inappropriate words.
4. Time and/or place disorientation, i.e. more than momentary confusion.
5. Poor or decreased judgment.
6. Problems with abstract thinking, e.g. simple math
7. Misplacing things, i.e. losing things in Obvious places or misplacing things in unusual places.
8. Changes in mood or behavior; may be rapid changes without apparent reason.
9. Personality changes.
10. Loss of initiative; lack of interest in usual pursuits.

Individuals who exhibit several of these symptoms should see a physician.
