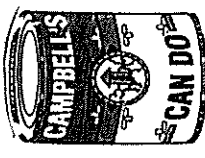

Kelly Trambly, with The Campbell Area Foundation, presented the group's plan to redo the Campbell sign. A motion was made by Trambly and seconded by Skupa to give permission to the CAF to continue with their plans. Roll call: aye – 5, nay – 0.

A motion was made by Trambly and seconded by L'Heureux to approve the building permit for Rob Rutt to put a storage building south of the building on the corner of Merrill St. and 44 Road (county line). Roll call: aye – 5, nay – 0.

The Board discussed redoing the charges for building permits with no action taken.

A motion was made by Skupa and seconded by Lang to hire Patchmaster to do repairs on the streets. Roll call: aye – 5, nay – 0.

The Board discussed having a maintenance plan for the upkeep of our streets. It was agreed to return to a 3-year maintenance plan.

A motion was made by L'Heureux and seconded by Lang to accept Aaron Dozier's bid of \$550 for the 1997 F-150 Ford city pickup. Roll call: aye – 5, nay – 0.

A motion was made by Trambly and seconded by Skupa to purchase a mosquito sprayer from the City of Cambridge not to exceed \$1000. Roll call: aye – 5, nay – 0.

A motion was made by Pearson and seconded by L'Heureux to grant permission for the American Legion to block off Broad St. from Hwy 4 to South Railway St. from 1:00 to 2:30 for the parade and continue to block off Broad St. from Merrill St. to South Railway St. from 2:30

to 5:00 for the antique car, tractor and motorcycle show on Saturday, June 15, 2019. Roll call: aye – 5, nay – 0.

The following action item was tabled until the next meeting:

1. Discuss adopting Ordinance 18-2 finalizing the sale of certain property to Hoffmeister Homes, Inc., etc.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 8:57 a.m. to the call of the Chair.

100 YEARS CELEBRATION

The American Legion 100 Years Celebration began with approximately 30 men, women, and kids running a mile to begin the day. Following the run was the parade of 104 entries; face painting, games at the park, a craft show, a display of military uniforms, and other events. In the evening, a USO Show was held and birthday cake was served. The night continued with

karaoke and a dance. It was an enjoyable day for all.

BIRTH OF THE LEGION

In early 1919, General Headquarters called upon twenty officers from the American Expeditionary Forces for ideas on how to improve the morale of the troops. One of these officers, Lieutenant Theodore Roosevelt Jr. proposed an organization of veterans. In February 1919, this group formed a temporary committee of several hundred officers who had the respect and confidence of the whole army. The first meeting was held in Paris in March of 1919, with one thousand officers and men attending. Every soldier serving in the AEF was considered a member at this time. A temporary constitution and the name "American Legion" were adopted. Meanwhile, troops were organizing at home, and the first national meeting was held in May of 1919, and a constitution was adopted. Our local post was organized on October 2nd, 1930, and named in memory of Willie Fierstein, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Fierstein, Sr., who was the first Campbell boy to lose his life in WWII. Willie, age 23, was sent to France with the 89th Division and was killed October 2, 1918.


